## Anticoma tenuis ALLGÉN

From the above-named localities some specimens of an Anticomid were recorded, which in their whole shape agree rather well with this small, southern species, described first by the present author (1930) from the Staten Island in the Fuegian Archipelago.

It is easily recognizable by its elongated, thin, about evenly thick body, its rounded head and its filiform tail, similar to that of A. similis COBB.




Fig. 1. Anticoma tenuis Allgén a. Anterior end, × 450, b. Tail and spicular app., × 270
